2014-2015 Pledge Drive

Pledging Sunday is March 9th and marks the kick-off of our 2014-2015 Pledge Drive. In anticipation of your questions and to demystify pledging, your Stewardship Team offers the following Q&A. Additional questions? Contact Carla Allison or Margaret Mann, Stewardship Team Co-Chairs

Why pledge? You pledge to be part of boldly growing compassion, justice and joy! Your pledge goes directly to fund daily operations that ensure our mission is fulfilled, now and in the future.

What is the money used for? Your money is used to transform lives, those of your Church 'Ohana, and your larger community. Your pledge ensures the quality of weekly worship and music, impacts the lives of our keiki

and adults through our religious education program, contributes to the expansion of Unitarian Universalism to west Oahu and Hawaii Island, made marriage equality a reality in Hawaii and helps launch our new social justice focus of ensuring Basic Needs for Hawaii, plus you contribute to expanding the Our Whole Lives sex education program throughout Hawaii and more!

Is pledging a requirement of membership? We expect that if you benefit from the Church and participate in activities you will also share in its financial upkeep. Some pledge a lot, others less. We can all share in supporting our Church.

How much should I pledge? You are encouraged to be as generous as possible. The

Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) has outlined fair share giving guidelines based on your income and commitment to the congregation. Plan on giving somewhere between 3% and 10% of your total income and to increase your pledge each year.

What about the money I put in the collection plate? You may use the Sunday offering to make pledge payments. As long as your offering can be associated with your pledge, what you put in the offering will be counted toward it. Please note your personal checks as pledge or place cash in an envelope with your name and pledge noted.

What if my financial circumstances change during the year, if I lose my job or

have a financial emergency? Lives are not static. Contact Carla Allison, Stewardship Team Co-Chair, if you need to adjust your pledge.

When do I pledge? Every spring you pledge for the new pledge year. March 9, 2014 is the launch of our pledge drive for pledge year 7/1/2014 – 6/30/2015.

After I pledge on March 9th, when do I start paying my pledge? You start paying this pledge on or after July 1, 2014 and complete payment by June 30, 2015.

What about the pledge I'm paying now? Please keep paying your current pledge. Don't let the launch of the 2014/15 pledge drive confuse you. You still have until June 30th to complete your current pledge.

The pledge year is confusing. Why don't we just use the calendar year? Our church fiscal year runs July 1 to June 30 so we've adopted the same timing for our pledge year. This timing allows our Budget Task Force and Finance Committee to prepare the budget based on the income we pledge to contribute and present it to us for a vote at the June Annual Meeting.

Men's Support Group

attendance.



THANK YOU ALL who stood up in body and/or spirit for the 2014 MLK Parade on Monday, January 20th. More than 30 UUs marched behind the First Unitarian Church of Honolulu banner, helped to organize the Rally in Kapiolani Park, or waved in support along the Parade route. The MLK Parade is an annual favorite as the Honolulu community gathers each January to reflect on the principles of service, political and economic equity, nonviolent social change, and global peace. Our next scheduled parade as a Church will be the 2014 Honolulu Pride Parade on **Saturday, June 7th**. We have much to march for!



PI'O, the Progressive Interfaith 'Ohana for Hawaii

A remarkable coalition of 100 progressive Hawaii clergy united last year around the Marriage Equality Campaign. We call this coalition the Progressive

Interfaith 'Ohana for Hawaii (PI'O). During a brunch at the First Unitarian Church of Honolulu on Thursday, January 23rd, PI'O formalized its intention to make the next Historic Moment happen in Hawaii, rather than wait for it to happen, when 30 religious leaders signed the following commitment:

The Historic Moments Project: Meeting Basic Needs Now!

In order to ensure basic needs respectfully throughout Hawai'i Nei, we the religious leaders of the Progressive Interfaith 'Ohana (PI'O), commit to:

1. Mālama 'āina
2. Healthy and local food production
3. Affordable housing
4. Quality accessible healthcare
5. Quality education
6. Personal safety and stable 'ohana
7. Responsible and effective governance
8. Economic equity.

To model interdependence, we re-commit to live in accordance with our shared religious values of treating each other as we ourselves would like to be treated.

Rev. Jonipher Kwong of the First Unitarian Church said, "Basic human needs impact

all of us, not just progressive religious communities or conservative ones, but every single person in Hawaii." Note that the Hawaiian word "pi'o" means arc, and the acronym "PI'O" refers to the quote by Unitarian minister Theodore Parker, "The arc of the moral universe is long, but it bends toward justice." Also attending the ceremony in support of the PI'O commitment were members of the Future Caucus of young leaders in the Hawaii State Legislature, including Takashi Ohno, Chris Lee, Kaniela Ing, and Nicole Lowen.

Next steps for PI'O include (1) gathering a PI'O core leader/manager team around core functions and (2) partnering in uniquely focused and effective Basic Needs actions for this uniquely positioned group, including PI'O-building actions as a whole as well as PI'O congregation-building actions. Imagine 100 social justice Congregations on the build toward one massive Arc on the bend! The Social Justice Council welcomes your thoughts toward making this happen!




Book Group
