From the Minister

Over the past two years, we've made some significant strides technologically. We installed three big monitors in the sanctuary, which has enhanced our worship experience, as we are now able to show videos and have the words to the music projected so our heads aren't bowed to the hymnal. We also have a roll-away monitor that's been used for Board meetings and presentations for various teams and groups, eliminating the need for paper and thus saving a few trees here and there.



Our social media presence has also increased over the years. I won't bore you with the statistics, but we've been reaching hundreds of people with up-to-the-minute information, especially during the Special Session. Our videos have been viewed by thousands of people all over the world. Since Roland began recording our services, people who are sick or traveling have been able to tune in online so they won't have to miss a transformative Sunday service.

Did you notice that our website has also been completely revamped? I want to especially thank Rev. Deborah Bond-Upson and Sheldon Dvojacki, who maintained and developed our website over the years. There have been 144 people to date who are signed up on Thrive to receive valuable updates on a weekly basis and access to critical documents including policies and fill out forms including space reservation.

Of course, there is always room for improvement, and we have a ways to go in terms of increasing our efficiencies and competencies when it comes to the use of technology to support our liberal faith. I am working with volunteers to hold more regular trainings on how to use Google and our website. I know there is a learning curve for some of you. In the meantime, we provide a variety of opportunities. People can still grab a hymnal, read the printed Weekly Bulletin, and call a friend!

Let us boldly grow our witness in our community!

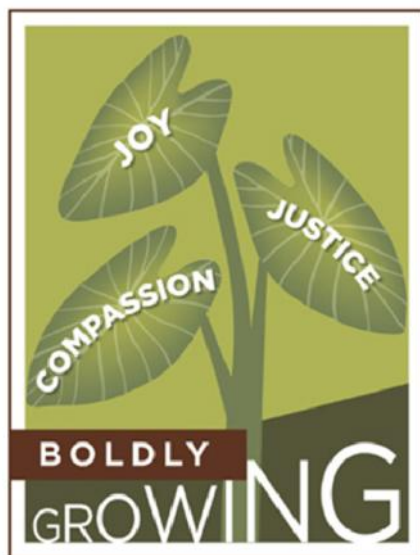

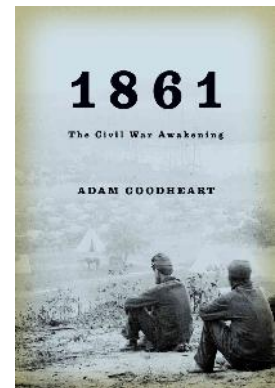
