Margaret Fuller (1810-1850) was a leading Transcendentalist along with Emerson and Thoreau. She wrote the groundbreaking book *Woman in the 19th Century* and was the first woman social and literary critic and foreign correspondent for *Horace Greeley's New York Tribune*. She called on Americans to question the second-class status of women, African- and Native Americans and to establish true democracy at home. This service focuses on her spiritual development, how she found the strength within herself to break free from the restrictions of her time and create an amazing body of work that still has relevance for us today.

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## From the Minister

For the past 60 years, the First Unitarian Church of Honolulu has influenced the writing of Hawaii's history. We are a people known to be right in the middle of social justice issues that impact the people of Hawai'i. This year is no exception. We began the year with 15 of our "green shirt" members lobbying at the State Capitol for marriage equality. We have about a dozen more march during the "Lighting Our Way to Justice" event at Iolani Palace demanding the U.S. Supreme Court to abide by our nation's highest principles of freedom and equality for all as they took up two crucial cases. In June, when the historic decision was finally handed down to overturn Prop. 8 and strike down the so-called "Defense of Marriage Act," we were there as well.



We knew, however, that the struggle was not pau yet. This was why a group of over 50 religious leaders from various stripes and backgrounds gathered together at our church on August 19, 2013 to sign a historical document supporting the freedom to marry. A few weeks later, we even had Rep.

Karl Rhoads, chair of the House Judiciary Committee, speak to a packed crowd after our Sunday service educating us on this social justice issue. A day later, the Governor

announced a special session to be held the last week of October.

And this is when we can literally write history again and put our faith into action by picking up the phone and calling our legislators, writing letters to the editor, and signing those postcards we are handing out at church. It is when we will once again march down the street, hold up a banner that says, "We are standing on the side of love" and share our stories of compassion, justice, and joy. Your voice can make a difference in this historic moment. Please make it count.

## Social Justice Council of the First Unitarian Church of Honolulu

### 2013 "Challenging Political or Religious Extremism" Award

The First Unitarian Church of Honolulu has been awarded the 2013 "Challenging Political or Religious Extremism" Award by the Interfaith Alliance of Hawaii (TIAH). This award recognizes a Hawaii based organization or institution that, through its witness and actions, has effectively challenged religious or political extremism in Hawaii in the past year. Sister Joan Chatfield made the nomination, saying in part that, under Rev. Jonipher Kwong's leadership, the First Unitarian Church of Honolulu deserves recognition for its genuine religious leadership in organizing religious leaders, for bringing many of its Congregation out to help, and for eminent hospitality to other groups using its facilities. Dave Hafner and Steve Lohse will accept the award on behalf of the Church at the TIAH 2013 Annual Awards Celebration and Dinner on Sunday, **October 13**, at the Nu'uuanu Congregational Church, 2651 Pali Highway, Honolulu.

### Governor Calls Marriage Equality Special Session — October 28th

Gov. Abercrombie has called the Hawaii State Legislature into a special Marriage Equality session to begin on October 28th. We are on the threshold of doing the right thing and making Marriage Equality the law in Hawaii. This is social justice at its finest, and the First Unitarian Church of Honolulu stands proudly with our Interfaith 'Ohana and our ACLU and Hawaii United for

Marriage (HUM) partners as we sail straight into this historic civil rights moment. There will be actions, we will keep you informed!

In fact, First Unitarian is hosting five consecutive Monday evenings of phone banking from 6:00 to 9:00 pm, including **October 7th, 14th and 21st**. Please feel free to join HUM in the Gallery on the Pali on these Monday evenings to help generate support for Marriage Equality. First Unitarian is also hosting a postcard table on three consecutive Sundays, including October 6th. Be sure to stop by before or after the 11:00 am Service to urge your State Legislator to Support Marriage Equality! Last month, we celebrated the history changing March on Washington. Our former Director of Religious Education was there and she has shared her experience with us:


"I came across three wooden buttons which I have saved for the last 50 years. They were on the dress I wore to the March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom, in August, 1963.

That was the summer after my first year in college. I was in California, and friend from Student Religious Liberals, the UU College Youth organization, called to say that several students

were driving from LA to DC to attend the March, and the SRL conference to follow. I flew to LA, and 6 of us drove from Riverside to DC in a borrowed car, with no back seat, before the invention of air conditioning. Six days, a thousand country western songs, as this was pre-Beatles!! Across Arizona, New Mexico, Oklahoma, and east. We arrived in Washington and slept on the floor at one of the UU churches in Bethesda. On the day of the march, 30 of us were bused to All Souls Church in Washington, D.C., and from there with MANY other UUs, to the Washington Monument, to march to the Lincoln

Memorial. We could almost hear the speeches, most of the songs, and the incredible feeling of being part of something new in the world.

Since that time I have had many occasions to remember the March, and the people who set out to change the world. And the buttons."

elegant one-page statement.

Over the next month, please take some time to review this important document. Focus initially on the concepts, not the wording. Does this document make you feel safe and will it help you to provide a safe place for others in the congregation? Will it improve our daily interactions and boldly grow Compassion, Justice and Joy

within our Congregation?

The MMT will present the Covenant with comments at a Church Service on **October 6, 2013.**

### The Proposed Covenant of Right Relations

We, the Congregation of the First Unitarian Church of Honolulu, in desiring to create an emotionally safe environment where we value kindness and honor diversity, covenant to:

Clarify and honor our time-frames and commitments.

Acknowledge one another's caring, creativity, and good intentions.

Express our appreciation for the amazing contributions of our Church Members, Leaders, and Professionals.

Create openness by expressing curiosity and wonder; check our assumptions by asking questions and verifying facts.

Use the democratic process whenever possible to create trust and inclusion.

Value confidentiality.

Communicate directly and promptly with the parties involved to resolve problems; avoid triangulation and refrain from speaking ill of others, especially in their absence.

When our passions produce strong feelings, concerns and differences of opinion . . . we covenant to:

Keep our body language receptive, our voice tone modulated, and our choice of words respectful.

Use "active listening" to express back to another their feelings and facts, to help one another be (and feel) heard, and to check that we have understood correctly.

Use "I messages" to openly express our feelings and concerns, and refrain from using "You messages," or labeling, judging, and

criticizing.

In the event the spirit of the Covenant has been broken, we can request a "time out" for momentary silence or to ask others to join in reading the Covenant together to restore emotional safety.

As a last resort, we may seek assistance from a trusted member of the Mission Ministry Team if we feel we cannot resolve a problem on our own.

Our attitude of gratitude is amplified as we know that through our honoring of this Covenant, we are boldly growing a world of Compassion, Justice, and Joy within ourselves, our Teams, our Congregation, our Community, our Denomination, and our entire planet Earth.




### Book Discussion Group
